| 06/??/2003 | When [redacted] and the other Federal Bureau of Investigation Agents he traveled with, first arrived at U.S. Naval Base Guantanamo Bay, Cuba the military showed them a video that was produced by the United States Army. [redacted] advised that the video was about how the military processed the detainees when they first arrived on the base. [redacted] recalled one portion of the video where the detainees were hooded and kneeling in what was referred to as the "pumpkin patch." Various military personnel were yelling and screaming at detainees while they were kneeling in the pumpkin patch. [redacted] advised that the "pumpkin patch" refers to the manner in which detainees are placed on the tarmac when they arrive and are removed from the aircraft. [redacted] recalled that while one soldier was yelling at a detainee in the pumpkin patch the detainee just passed out. [redacted] characterized the video as "hard core." Also, [redacted] thought at the time that it was bizarre the military was showing them this video. During that time he never witnessed nor heard of anyone using military working dogs during an interrogation of a detainee. When [redacted] asked the detainees who they meant when they said, "you guys," they told him the Federal Bureau of Investigation. [redacted] would then show the detainees his credentials and ask them if they were ever shown similar credentials by the people who had kept them up all night. The detainees always indicated that they had not seen any credentials and would often tell [redacted] to just forget about it. The detainees referred to these sorts of tactics as "the games." | Mon 06/02/2003 - Thu 07/17/2003 | <p>[redacted] advised of another situation in which unknown persons at U.S. Naval Base Guantanamo Bay, Cuba were impersonating Federal Bureau of Investigation Agents. One day [redacted] and another Federal Bureau of Investigation Agent rode the ferry back to the other side of U.S. Naval Base Guantanamo Bay, Cuba to meet the Federal Bureau of Investigation plane and pick-up some supplies. When [redacted] and the other agent were loading a hand truck onto the ferry the ferry captain remarked to them, "don't you guys have enough stuff on this ferry already?" [redacted] asked the ferry Captain to explain, and he told them that some Federal Bureau of Investigation guys had just loaded some pick-up trucks on the ferry to take back to the other side. [redacted] then asked the Captain if these supposed Federal Bureau of Investigation Agents had shown him Federal Bureau of Investigation credentials. The Captain replied no. When [redacted] or other Agents came to [redacted] with complaints or concerns regarding the military's interrogation techniques or treatment of the detainees, he would make note of them and advised that he would pass them up the chain. | Mon 06/02/2003 - Thu 07/17/2003 | [redacted] advised that many of the detainees that he attempted to interview while at U.S. Naval Base Guantanamo Bay, Cuba were very tired and often complained that they had been kept up all night. [redacted] stopped short of characterizing these detainees as sleep deprived, but certainly these detainees' sleep patterns had been drastically interrupted. | Mon 06/02/2003 - Thu 07/17/2003 | [redacted] advised that he witnessed or was present when detainees were subjected to loud music as a supposed interrogation tactic. Sometimes the music was so loud in the room adjacent to the one that [redacted] was using that he would have to cancel the interview. [redacted] regularly reported these incidents to his On-Scene Commander [redacted]. [redacted] advised [redacted] and other Agents to try to avoid interrogating detainees in trailers where they heard loud music emanating. [redacted] was walking into one of the interrogation trailers on this day, and some of the guys [redacted]. The interrogators on this day told [redacted] that [redacted] but [redacted] had no way of verifying that. [redacted] advised that the detainee in question was being subjected to 2 different kinds of loud music; heavy metal and possibly some form of Xydeco. [redacted] explained that often detainees would complain to him that the interrogation room they were in was too cold, but that was usually just because the detainees generally liked a warmer environment. [redacted] recalled that on a few occasions when he entered an interrogation room it was uncomfortably cold. In those cases he adjusted the thermostat on the air conditioner and soon thereafter the room reached a comfortable temperature. After viewing this video [redacted] told [redacted] "This is the last day that I will talk to you." [redacted] proceeded to tell [redacted] some of the things that happened to him there like diesel fuel and hand grenades being thrown down into where he and others were hiding. [redacted] would tell the military interrogators that he came in contact with that he didn't want to know some of the things that they were doing and often told them not to tell him things or to stop talking. These interrogators would sometimes ask [redacted] why he and other Federal Bureau of Investigation Agents were so squeamish.
