??/??/2002	[redacted] said that during both her tours at U.S. Naval Base Guantanamo Bay, Cuba the Federal Bureau of Investigation staff were told by the OSC's that if they witnessed some aggressive interrogation techniques they were to remove themselves from the room. During her second tour there was a special meeting held to convey this instruction to the Federal Bureau of Investigation staff at U.S. Naval Base Guantanamo Bay, Cuba. ??/??/2002	[redacted] says that she believes the military was "videotaping" Federal Bureau of Investigation interviews. [redacted] said that the guards were listening in, but they weren't supposed to. [redacted] says that "we" knew they were recording but they weren't supposed to be listening. [redacted] was under the impression that the video camera's that were in each interrogation room were recording each of the interrogations. Agents were told this by the OSC's on both of her TDY's to U.S. Naval Base Guantanamo Bay, Cuba. [redacted] recalls that the OSC's said that a purpose of a 302 is to document facts not speculation, and that if the detainee had a complaint the agents should document it in another fashion. 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	Investigation was allowed to do. [redacted] said that she thinks that some agents probably didn't report observations b/c they probably assumed that whatever they saw was an approved technique.		
??/??/2002	[redacted] advised that she heard from agents at U.S. Naval Base Guantanamo Bay, Cuba that water and certain food items were used as bargaining tools in interviews. [redacted] said that she heard that in some interviews if the detainee asked for water then agent would say first you have to give me some information then I will get you some water. [redacted] heard that this particular detainee had a portion of his leg blown off overseas and the U.S. military was fitting him for a prosthetic leg. [redacted] said that she thinks that military gave him the leg anyway. [redacted] says that the agent involved was [redacted] out of the Hawaii office. ??/??/2002	[redacted] explained that during interviews some agents would give detainees snacks and water whenever they wanted and some agents would not. Some would try to get the detainee to cooperate before they provided them with water or snacks. ??/??/2002	[redacted] advised that [redacted] told her that he definitely heard and most likely observed a detainee shackled in an interrogation room in such a manner that he was forced to stand in an uncomfortable position; standing bent over. [redacted] told [redacted] that he heard the detainee b/c he was screaming in pain. [redacted] advised that someone from either DHS or DOE [redacted] was interrogating this detainee. [redacted] advised that [redacted] explained to her that the detainee was standing bent over at the hip and the interrogators were in the room making sure that the detainee did not squat or move to a more comfortable position. [redacted] arrived at U.S. Naval Base Guantanamo Bay, Cuba after her second TDY to U.S. Naval Base Guantanamo Bay, Cuba and he told her about this incident when he got back to Chicago. ??/??/2002	[redacted] advised that an Federal Bureau of Investigation agent named [redacted] who was out of the Philadelphia FO, told her that one a couple of occasions he walked out of detainee interviews due to the behavior of the DHS -DOD personnel in the interview. [redacted] advised detainees were still being "shipped in" and she worked with the supervisor down there, Joseph M. Demarest, Jr., to help rank the detainees in order of importance. There were a lot of turf battles between the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the military [redacted] ver who was going to have access to whom, and who was to interview which detainee and when. Mon 04/15/2002 - Fri 05/24/2002	[redacted] said that during her first tour she prepared a database on the detainees based upon her review of 302's. The database contained the detainees' names, ages, DOB's, the languages they spoke, what countries they were from, and the reasons they provided as to why they were in Afghanistan or Pakistan. Mon 04/15/2002 - Fri 05/24/2002	[redacted] advised that during her first TDY to U.S. Naval Base Guantanamo Bay, Cuba detainees were still held at Camp X-Ray and the entire camp was bathed in light. [redacted] said that she could see the light shining on the camp from her hooch. When she was given a tour of Camp X-Ray by a United States Army Criminal Investigative Division agent she was told that they were keeping on the lights as both a security measure and a sleep deprivation technique. [redacted] said that the Federal Bureau of Investigation worked well together with the other military law enforcement agents, the problems were with [redacted] the Defense Humint Services. The problems were that [redacted] Defense Humint Services were not sharing information with the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the way they conducted their interviews caused problems when they interviewed detainees the Federal Bureau of Investigation was interviewing. [redacted] sometimes had to go around [redacted] Defense Humint Services by going to the National Security Agency, who were located on the "high side" at U.S. Naval Base Guantanamo Bay, Cuba. [redacted] said that she thinks that at least in part this was done to disrupt their sleep. [redacted] is not sure, but she thinks that there may have been lotions involved. [redacted] said that she was also told that this female military interrogator did a lap dance on the detainee.

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
