

In Wyoming, people convicted of a felony have the right to reclaim their vote.

If you were convicted of a **non-violent felony** and have no convictions for another crime:

After five years have passed since full completion of your sentence – incarceration, probation, parole – you can apply to the State Board of Parole to have your voting rights restored.

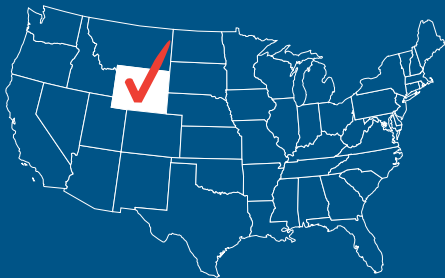
If you were convicted of a **violent felony** or are a **repeat offender**, and have completed your full sentence:

After five years have passed, you can apply to the Governor to have your voting rights restored.

It is both the right and responsibility of all citizens to vote.

Voting after incarceration is an important way for you to connect with your community. Voting ensures that your voice, and the voice of your family and community is heard in Wyoming.
