SUBJECT: Legal Review of AR 15-6 Investigation - Sniper Team Killing of two local nationals occurring on 15 January 2006, 3-67 Armor Regiment, Camp Rustamiyah, Iraq

- 1. I have completed a legal review of the subject investigation and find it to be legally sufficient IAW AR 15-6, para. 2-3(b). While there are significant discrepancies in the witnesses' statements (e.g., whether the occupants of the homes fired a weapon, and whether the US Forces team engaged a male or female) the evidence indicates that US Forces acted as a result of a perceived hostile act.
- 2. Agree with the investigating officer that you request, to MND-B, guidance on the use of civilian homes, permissively or non-permissively, for military operations (OPs/FPs). Current MNC-I and MND-B ROE and Law of Armed Conflict concepts makes the practice of using civilian structures, and detaining local nationals in their homes, for military purposes questionable.
- 3. Among the discrepancies noted in the investigation are the following:
- a. and a state that they heard "AK" fire coming from within the house. He states he saw the local national male insert a magazine, charge the weapon, and point the weapon in his direction from a large window, at which point fired three rounds at the person (Exhibit I). The surviving occupants state that no weapons were fired from within the house (Exhibit K & L). In addition, the consequence management team found evidence of four bullet holes in the window and US Forces fired four rounds into the home through the same window (Exhibit V). The preponderance of the evidence indicates that there were no weapons fire originating from within the local nation's home.
- b. Sand fired three shots at what he thought was a male with a weapon in one hand and a lantern in the other hand (Exhibit I). Salso states that he fired one round at what he says was a male. However, local national occupant witness' statements say that the female (mother) was the one who was shot directly. In addition, the autopsy report (Exhibit Z) indicates that the mother was shot four times: two bullet entries in the front of the neck and exiting the back of the neck and front side of right shoulder; one near the lower side of the genitalia, exiting the left side of the stomach; and one shot entry in the right thigh and exit

## Section IV - Findings

# What were the facts and circumstances leading to the shooting?

This incident occurred during a joint operation between Navy Special Operations Forces (NAVSOF) and 3-67 AR Battalion Forces. NAVSOF forces had command and control of this operation. Additional security, infiltration, and exfiltration operations were conducted by 3-67 AR Battalion personnel and equipment. The incident was executed as an extension of Operation Mousetrap. (See Exhibit X) The task for this operation was to coverfly insert sniper teams into Observation Posts (OPs) around CP 515. The purpose was to conduct overwatch operations of CP 515 to deny AIF the ability to emplace EFP (EDs and to provide coalition forces the freedom of movement along MSR Pluto. (See Exhibit B)

On the afternoon of 14 JAN 06, NAVSOF personnel conducted a ground reconnaissance of a residential home (the objective) at grider to the consistence consisted of driving by the home, shooting digital video footage, and still digital photographs (See Exhibit P) of the objective. According to (See Exhibit I), the house appeared to be unoccupied in the video footage, and photographs. According to NAVSOF personnel who were briefed by CP, the 3-67 AR S-2, that there was a 50/50 chance that homes in the overwatch area would be receptive to emplacing OPs within their residences (See Exhibit A).

After the reconnaissance was conducted NAVSOF and 3-67 personnel continued with execution of their Troop Leading Procedures for the operation. An OPORD brief was given, rehearsals were conducted (rock drill), and ROE briefs were conducted. (See . Exhibits A through J)

The operation started at approximately 15 0030 JAN 05 with the patrol exiting FOB Rustamiyah in M2A2 Bradleys and M1114 UAHs. The vehicles proceeded to the release point (RP) and NAVSOF and 3-67 personnel dismounted. Personnel then conducted approximately a 300 - 500m foot patrol from the RP to the objective (Residential home a Successible). (See Exhibits A through J)

At approximately 15 0145 JAN 05 NAVSOF and 3-67 personnel began to set up security at the objective. While security was being emplaced a LN woman began screaming (in Arabic) from inside the residence. The Patrol Leader, Intelligence Specialism, and the interpreter began trying to get permissive access to the home. They and the interpreter) did this by knocking on an exterior door several times and yelling (See Exhibit E) that they were American Forces and that they meant them (the occupants of the residence) no harm. According to the interpreter, He did not think that the occupants of the house could hear them because there was too much screaming (See Exhibit J). Concurrently, Hospital Corpsman, breached another exterior door (See Exhibit F), and he and Gunner's Material Security of the security of the left interior door (See Exhibits F, G, and O). He then began to try and gain access into the left interior door.

(See Exhibit G). Concurrently, the interpreter reported that the LN woman screamed "get the AK" in Arabic. Soon after, (3-67 AR) from his position outside the house saw a man approach the window with an AK. He then yelled "AK" from position (See Exhibit F, I). states that he observed a LN man load a magazine into the AK and charge the weapon. then states that the man then pointed the weapon directly at him through the window (See Exhibit I). He states that he fired his weapon at the LN male with the AK (See Exhibit I). (NAVSOF) stated that he heard "AK" yelled and ceased attempting to breach the interior door. states that he then saw muzzle flash from inside the house. He then fired one shot from his SR-25 at the LN male armed with an AK (See Exhibit F). Other NAVSOF Personnel ( and Operations Specialist stated that they heard AK fire. (See Exhibits E, G, and H). After the shots ordered a cease fire, and ordered the team to exfiltrate the objective. (See Exhibit F)

The Iraqi Police report (See Exhibit M) and death certificates (See Exhibits R and T) obtained from LN family members during a consequence management visit to the residence confirm that a LN male and LN female died as a direct result of this incident.

# Did the shooting comply with the rules of engagement?

Yes. Evidence shows all US forces acted in self-defense. Statements from US forces involved (See Exhibits E, F, G, I), the interpreter (See Exhibit J), and statements from Local National sources through the THT (See Exhibits K and L) support this.

Evidence gathered from the investigation, both from US forces and LN sources, indicates that the scene at the objective was dark, ever changing, and chaotic. According to the interpreter, there was no electricity in the house. (See Exhibit J). The only light source from the interior of the house was a lantern (See Exhibits E and I) Although it was 100% illumination at 15 0145 JAN 05 there was not any street lights, exterior lights, or interior lights in the vicinity of the house. Team members approached the house using Night Vision Devices (NVDs), but went to flashlight once they lost the element of surprise (See Exhibit G). In the estimation of and the interpreter, the time period of between the LN woman starting to scream and shots being fired was less than 30 seconds. In photographs taken by the consequence management team, the window has 4 visible bullet holes through the glass and bullet holes and bullet impact damage to the interior walls of the structure. (See Exhibit Q and V) Statements gathered from LN sources do not support the claim by US forces that the deceased LN male approached the window with an AK or that the AK was fired. However, LN sources do confirm that there was an AK in the house. Through this investigation, I conclude that regardless of whether or not the AK was physically pointed at the scene or fired at him; conditions existed at the scene statements that they acted in accordance with the rules of engagement once they felt that a hostile act had been directed against

The evidence supports that while US forces were attempting to gain access to the LN residence, a woman inside the residence began screaming thinking that they were getting robbed. One son reported to a tactical human intelligence team (THT) member that his mother yelled "thieves, thieves" in Arabic (See Exhibit M). The interpreter then communicated to US Forces that she called for her husband to get the AK (See Exhibit J). Following that, stated that he saw a LN male load and charge an AK inside the structure. Given the low light; the screaming; the interpreter translations of "Get the AK"; and the short time span that elapsed, conditions existed at the time of the incident that support hostile intent towards US forces. LN family thought they were getting robbed. The family tries to protect themselves. In the process US forces act in self defense.

The evidence found in Exhibit Z identifies several inconsistencies between coalition personnel sworn statements, and the autopsy results. Statements from coalition personnel indicate that the LN male pointed a loaded AK-47 at and an action state that they saw a LN male point a weapon at them from inside the house (See Exhibits F and I). However, autopsies performed by Dr. and Dr. and Dr. indicate that the LN female died of direct gun shot wounds while the LN male died with injuries associated from bullet fragments (See Exhibit Z).

I conclude that may have fired on the LN female as opposed to the LN male. I attribute these inconsistencies due to the low level of light, the observation of the LN with the AK-47 through a glass window, the short period of time in which these events occurred, and the chaotic environment that existed while coalition personnel attempted to gain entrance into the residence.

Given the evidence from all sources, I conclude that the last fired his M-16 in self defense, and the last fired his SR-25 in an effort to protect from a LN located inside the residence. Both personnel thought that the LN posed an imminent threat to
