Budget Narrative

The Newark Police Department proposes to utilize the funding received from the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant to purchase 25 marked police cruisers to augment the current fleet that is aging. The primary responsibility of the police department is to efficiently and safely respond to calls for service from the community. Other priorities of law enforcement include proactive patrol duties, motor vehicle enforcement and general visibility to promote the image and feeling of safety in our city.

The City of Newark has a large population of adult and youth ex-offenders, who face barriers to reintegrating into society. A program is needed to reduce the number of people sent to jail, while providing the perpetrators of low-level crimes with social services and a chance to give back to their community. Funding the personnel and related expenses to found Community and Youth Courts in the City of Newark will help address these issues.

We will dedicate the remaining balance of our award to provide overtime funding for crime-specific patrol and suppression details over the four-year grant period. Due to budget shortfalls, the City is unable to dedicate additional patrols during the summer months and holidays when we experience crime spikes. Also, when there are sudden increases in certain crimes, such as robberies or shootings, we need to increase both patrol and investigative resources to respond to it effectively. Because of our volume of calls for service, our patrol units cannot possibly devote their duty time to proactively address one certain neighborhood that is suffering from specific crime issues. We have used additional patrol and crime suppression details in the past with great success. While working on overtime details, these officers can concentrate their resources to just the affected neighborhoods and the particular crime problem at hand.

Also, as the lead agency, we will be tasked with several administrative duties and reporting requirements related to this award. This will place a burden on the staff of the Newark Police Department and will require overtime expenditures to ensure proper management of the grant. Therefore, we are requesting to use 4% of the total award to offset the expense caused by additional time required to fulfill our obligation.

The Belleville Police Department wishes to fund the outfitting of two currently owned Emergency Response trucks and the purchase of equipment to assist the department members in their duties, such as police radios for patrol cruisers, reflective vest (to be in compliance with the new federal regulation as noted in 23 CFR 634), K-9 equipment, a computer for a cruiser, a covert camera and 50% of the cost of a phone used during hostage situations that includes covert video and audio, and tactical vests for the Emergency Response Team.

These items will benefit the department's ability to provide efficient police services and also prepare members of certain response units to be prepared in the event of a crisis.

Budget Narrative

The Bloomfield Police Department wishes to fund three projects. The first consists of purchasing and outfitting the patrol cruisers and police motorcycles with on-board video recording equipment. These systems will allow the video and audible recordation of motor

vehicle stops, pursuits and other contacts with the public for quality assurance and will also provide a historical record of the events. This equipment will also limit the liability of the department against frivolous claims against officers.

The 2nd project will be the purchase of three stationary solar/electric speed panel displays. These warning boards will be strategically placed where there is a documented speeding problem. By alerting the motorists of their speed and the speed limit, we will reduce the number of speeders and thereby reduce the amount of speed-related crashes. These are an effective alternative to stationing a police officer at problem locations and will allow that officer to remain on patrol and answer calls for service.

The final project will include upgrading the in-house Mercom Voice logger phone/radio recorder in the Central Communications room. The current system is outdated and technical support is now unavailable. This new system will provide live monitoring and will electronically record all telephonic and radio transmissions, while at the same time allowing for instant playback. This system will create/maintain an archive of these recordings.

Budget Narrative

The Township of Irvington, NJ is 2.8 square miles in size and has a population of over 61,000 people. Over 12% of the residents live below the poverty level and 10.4% are unemployed. The township has been faced with severe financial difficulties and is now considering laying off municipal workers and instituting furloughs for others.

The police department employs 180 full-time sworn officers and responds to over 70,000 calls-for-service annually. The town is unable to provide updated equipment for the police department without creating a burden on municipal budgets. This includes essential equipment needed to function everyday and to provide basic law enforcement services.

The following is a list of requested items:

- 10 marked police cruisers outfitted with all emergency lighting, two-way police radios and MDTs. These vehicles will replace some of the oldest in the

aging fleet, which have become both a hazard and a liability. Since the marked cruisers operate 24 hours per day, the life of these vehicles is limited. **\$350,000**

- 6 unmarked police cruisers to be used by the investigative units within the department who work in plain clothes as part of their assignments. These cars will replace older and unreliable undercover cars. **\$120,000**
- 1 prisoner transport vehicle. The current prisoner transport vehicle is 10 years old and needs frequent servicing. This creates a burden on patrol because several units are needed to transport multiple prisoners where a transport van can bring them all at once. The new vehicle will also significantly reduce the liability and improve the safety of both the officers and the prisoners. **\$25,000**
- 12 workstations for detectives to replace current desks and chairs that are over 30 years old. These items will be affixed with modem jacks so the investigators can connect their laptops. **\$40,000**
- 12 laptop computers for the Detective Bureau. These computers will afford detectives access to reports and other information both at police headquarters and at crime scenes. **\$12,000**
- Evidence Drying Cabinet. This is a modern evidence storage unit to secure evidence recovered from crime scenes and prevent its destruction or contamination. **\$8,000**
- Crime Scene Equipment including cameras and evidence collection equipment for the proper processing of physical evidence at crime scenes. **\$8,000**
- Portable Lighting Equipment to be used by detectives and other units within the department to illuminate crime scenes at night and provide lighting for any operation after sunset. **\$5,000**
- 200 lockers for police officers to store required equipment and uniforms. The current lockers are in disrepair and do not provide adequate security from thefts. **\$30,000**
- 12 Workstations for the Operations Bureau. These include desks with docking stations for laptop computers. Patrol officers are assigned computers that are installed in the police cruisers and are used to complete reports and access information. These computers will be able to be brought to roll call briefings and crime analysis meetings. **\$40,000**
- Equipment for the Computer Statistics Center (COMPSTAT). These include desks, chairs, computers, projection screen, and projector to establish a COMPSTAT Center for presentations of criminal statistics, strategy meetings and weekly crime analysis. **\$60,000**

- Upgrade of the in-house computer operating system. The current operating system is over ten years old and technical support will soon be unavailable. It also cannot support much of the new technology that will soon be introduced by the Department. **\$123,488**

In the State of New Jersey, the attorney general requires all interviews and statement-taking of serious crimes to be recorded. The Millburn Police Department will use the award to replace the current digital video recording system (DVR) in the detective's interview room used for interviews and statement-taking. The department will also purchase a separate DVR for the prisoner processing room, where interviews are often held for those in custody. This purchase includes all hardware and associated software.

The current system in the detective unit has been put together using harvested parts and has become unreliable. The prisoner processing area has no system at all and this creates a safety concern when arrestees must be walked to another part of the facility to have their statements or confessions recorded.

The Montclair Police Department requests funding for overtime costs to facilitate uniformed officers on walking posts along the Central, South End and Upper Montclair Business District in the township. One officer will walk each of the three posts three days or nights per week. The hours of the details will vary and be determined by crime assessments and need.

Montclair has used previous JAG funding for similar programs and had great success both by deterring crime and citizen satisfaction. Crime in the town has decreased steadily for the past six years. The most notable decrease has been in the areas of motor vehicle thefts and burglaries from autos, specific to the goals of this program.

Just recently, however, there has been an increase of armed robberies in the business district where these funded programs will be employed. These additional foot patrols will attempt to address these crimes.

The South Orange Police Force is requesting to utilize the 2009 Justice Assistance Grant to purchase a property and evidence tracking system, one digital license plate reader, and costs to upgrade the department's server capabilities to provide additional data compiling and storage needed to run the property and evidence tracking system and digital license plate reader. Currently, the department manually enters and tracks property and evidence in our custody. The property and evidence tracking system will enable our property and evidence custodian to enter all property and evidence, and to better track property and evidence for court preparation, storage, and timely destruction. The digital license plate reader will be mounted on a police vehicle and will enable the police officer to check all passing vehicles for any warrants, wants, and outstanding motor vehicle suspensions. This electronic reader will also store and compile all vehicles read, which can be later used for investigations and parking offenses. The server upgrades are needed to store and analyze the data collected from the digital license plate reader and property and evidence tracking system.

Budget Narrative

The West Orange Police Department proposes to purchase 4 Automated License Plate Readers. Funding from the JAG will be combined with forfeiture funds for the purchase. The total price for all four items is \$81,480. The entire \$56,686 JAG award will be put toward the purchase price and the remaining balance will be paid by forfeiture funds distributed by the county prosecutor's office.

Cameras, mounted to police vehicles automatically take photos of license plates at the rate of hundreds per minute. The characters in the photo of the plate are then translated into letters and numbers and compared to law enforcement databases of registered vehicles known to be or suspected of being involved with crimes or infractions. If a license plate that was read matches an entry on a database, the license plate reader system will alert the officer or command center (if data is transferred to a remote management facility) that a suspect vehicle is in the immediate area of that system.

SECTION II.

Term

Participation in the ARRA FY2009 Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) Program shall commence upon receipt of the grant funds by the "Administering Agency" through September 30, 2013 or until all grant funds are expended.

Doornbos, Rahal following their game

INDIANAPOLIS — Robert Doornbos is trying to keep it simple. Graham Rahal is trying to keep it fast.

Both are making their game plans work.

Instead of looking at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway's 2.5-mile track as one huge oval, rookie Doornbos sees it as two long straightaways separated by four fast corners. He figures that's a lot less tricky to handle than the 13-turn Formula One road course he had to navigate the last time he drove at Indy.

And Rahal, already with two poles this season, wants another one for the race on May 24.

He got on the track for the first time yesterday during an early flurry of activity amid a threat of more rain. Within a half-dozen laps, ached more than 220 mph.

Basically, it's an absolutely brand new car that has been at the shop since last fall, and all winter the team has been working on it," Rahal said. "I think they did a pretty good job, because the thing looks fast for sure."

Doornbos, in his first IndyCar season this year as Rahal's teammate with Newman/Haas/Lanigan Racing, easily passed his rookie test on opening day Tuesday but was not among the three who made it onto the track in Wednesday's 45-minute rain-shortened practice session.

Doornbos was back on the track yesterday and, within his first six laps, was up to more than 221 mph. His top lap later in the day was at 223.592, seventh-fastest among the 32 drivers on the track.

"I think it's great. I sleep on the track, I eat on the track, I do everything on the track ... I race on the

track, so it's going to be an intense month," said the 27-year-old Dutchman, one of six rookies trying to land spots in the race.

Marco Andretti had the top speed of the day at 225.478 mph.

"We really worked on the car the whole day. The car was good to run with it," Andretti said. "It's super-close out there, and it's going to be even closer as we go on. So hopefully we'll just build on what we did today."

Penske teammates Helio Castroneves and Ryan Briscoe were next at 225.237 and 224.904, respectively, followed by defending champion Scott Dixon at 224.448 and his Ganassi teammate Dario Franchitti at 224.160.

Rahal was ninth-fastest at 222.996 mph.

Rahal, who won his IndyCar debut last year at St. Petersburg at

19, started from the pole and finished seventh in two of the first three races this season. He started seventh and finished 12th in the other race, putting him eighth in points heading into Indy. He said there's plenty of time to get ready for pole qualifying Saturday — unless it rains again.

"It's a shame, and more so because it's no fun to sit here doing nothing all day," said Rahal, who qualified 13th at Indianapolis as a rookie last year but crashed early and finished 33rd.

Doornbos is 13th in points this season, the highest among all rookies, with a best finish of ninth at Long Beach. The next race, at

Kansas, he started second and led two laps before finishing 12th.

"I seem to learn fast on the ovals, and the team is doing a good job, so I don't see why we shouldn't be in the top 11 (qualifying spots to be filled Saturday)," he said. "There isn't a big oval feeling to the track."

Doornbos' last appearances at Indianapolis were as an F1 test driver during the U.S. Grand Prix in 2005 and 2006. He also drove in 11 F1 races in '05 and '06 and was the rookie of the year in the former Champ Car series in 2007.

"Obviously it was very different then," he said of his F1 testing at Indy. "You fly in and out for the

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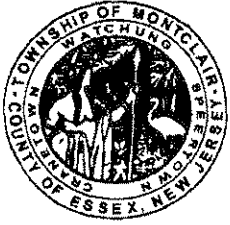

The Montclair Police Department would like to reallocate a portion of the FY2009 Recovery Act: Edward Byrne Memorial JAG funding towards the purchase of a new T-3 three-wheeled Electric Law Enforcement Personal Mobility Vehicle (scooter). We believe that this innovative vehicle will allow our officers assigned to "walking posts" to cover more area while remaining visible and accessible to the public. The T-3 is designed specifically for police use and will be decal'd just as regular marked police car would be and equipped with emergency lighting and communication equipment very similar to the 9 Law Enforcement Personal Mobility Vehicles recently purchased by the Paterson Police Department through federal grant funds.

Our original Budget Narrative and Budget Detail indicated that the entire \$63,801 Award would be used to pay officers at a rate of \$50 per hour to facilitate the implementation of Business District walking posts. The quoted cost of the T-3 Electric Law Enforcement Personal Mobility Vehicle is \$12,270. We are requesting a grant adjustment that would allow the Montclair Police Department to purchase this vehicle through the FY2009 Recovery Act: Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant. The remaining \$51,531 would continue to be used to pay officers assigned to extra duty walking posts in our business districts.

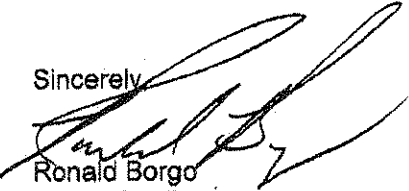

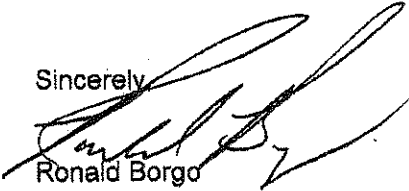
