Dear Speaker Boehner and Democratic Leader Pelosi:

The undersigned organizations oppose the SAFE ACT (H.R. 2278) – on its own or as a part of any other legislation – and urge you and your membership not to allow it to be brought to the floor for a vote. As leaders of the U.S. House of Representatives, you should reject the unprecedented delegation of federal immigration enforcement authority to fifty different states and thousands of localities and the criminalization of undocumented immigrants' mere presence in the United States. Ultimately, this misguided policy would provoke such distrust between immigrant communities and law enforcement that it would seriously undermine the safety of all our communities across the nation.

The current bipartisan effort to achieve common-sense immigration reform should focus on the basic American principles of preserving family unity, opposing wasteful spending, and protecting fundamental human rights that we guarantee for every individual. H.R. 2278 runs counter to these principles and would lead to the kind of racial profiling seen under Arizona's SB 1070 law, which was largely struck down as unconstitutional by the U.S. Supreme Court. We urge you not to lead our nation to take this considerable step backward from due process and equality.

A majority of Americans are in favor of common-sense immigration reform, and will not accept costly and ineffective measures to target immigrants for prosecution, detention, and deportation. H.R. 2278 mandates that DHS acquire expensive new detention cells at taxpayer expense to keep many more immigrants in detention (for some, possibly indefinitely) without the chance for a judge to determine whether or less costly, and equally effective, alternatives to detention should be used—thus lining the pockets of private prison corporations and drastically curtailing due process.

This is precisely why law enforcement leaders across the country (including the Major City Chiefs Association, which represents the 63 largest police departments in the United States) reject the SAFE Act. It is also why communities across the country believe H.R. 2278 would poison the promise of immigration reform, even if the proposal is included in a broader set of policies that provide many immigrants with a pathway to citizenship. We urge you to heed their call and ours as you lead the House of Representatives in considering comprehensive immigration reform that is humane, fiscally responsible, and in line with American principles of due process and fairness.
