SUBJECT: PAKISTAN MEDIA REACTION: JANUARY 31, 2008

SUMMARY: Reports of the recovery of dead bodies of 13 missing soldiers from Darra Adamkhel as normalcy started returning to the militancy-hit semi tribal valley dominated headlines in all newspapers on Thursday. The slain soldiers were kidnapped by militants from Kohat Tunnel last Friday. The English daily, "The News," reported that the Tuesday "drone attack was to hit Obaidah al-Masri and Abu Laith al-Libi," two senior Al-Qaeda commanders. Most newspapers also reported the Foreign Office Spokesman's remarks that "there were no U.S. troops in Pakistan," and that any "foreign operation on Pak soil to be defied."

Several major dailies highlighted a report that "U.S. plans to spend \$2b to befriend Pakistani tribesmen," as "education and jobs may make FATA less hospitable for Al-Qaeda and Taliban." Also

underscored by some major dailies were (repassified U.S. "lawmakers urge Bush administration to increase pressure on the government in Islamabad to ensure free and fair elections in Pakistan." Several newspapers also continued reporting stories on the death of U.S. diplomat Keith Ryan and reported that the "American diplomat's body flown home."

Most major dailies ran editorials on a host of subjects concerning the current wave of extremism and terrorism. The English daily, "The News," noted that "involving people in the struggle against extremism, unveiling the still hidden faces of those who are behind the violence we see everywhere, is necessary to finally overcome them." Another English daily, "The Post," observed that "if the U.S. actually wants the war on terrorism to be successful and harbors the desire to root out extremist forces, it has to do away with its policy of not backing the forces of moderation represented by the political parties and civil society at large." In its editorial on State of the Union Address, the Urdu daily, "Nawa-i-Waqt," observed that "President Bush has made up his mind to weaken Pakistan to fulfill his crusading Zionist ambitions." Commenting on the alleged maltreatment of Edhi (renowned social worker) by the U.S. immigration officials, the Urdu daily, "Jang," wrote: "This kind of behavior is a result of their (Americans') prejudice and narrow-mindedness against Islam and Muslims." 1. "Bodies Of 13 Troops Retrieved From Darra" "The News" (01/31)

"The security forces on Wednesday retrieved 13 bodies of troops from the hilltop near Darra Adamkhel as normalcy started returning to the militancy-hit semi-tribal valley. The 13 soldiers were kidnapped on the first day of the operation in the gun-manufacturing town, when suspected militants attacked an Army radar post on the Japanese-built Friendship Tunnel, sources told "The News." After retrieval of the soldiers' bodies, the losses suffered by the military now stand at 23 while the tally of the militants is reported to be at 64, said a senior Army officer."

2. "Mirali Drone Attack Was To Hit Masri, Libi" "The News" (01/31)

"The Tuesday attack on a house in Mirali town by the CIA-operated spy planes was aimed at targeting two senior Al Qaeda Commanders, sources said. The sources told "The News" that the two men, whom the CIA wanted to kill, were Obaidah al Masri and Abu Laith al Libi. Both of them were described as No. 3 and 4 in Al Qaeda rank, said the sources."

3. "7 Arabs Among Missile Victims" "Dawn" (01/31)

"Militants retrieved and buried on Wednesday the bodies of 12 foreigners who had been killed in a missile attack on a residential compound in the Khushali Toorikhel area of North Waziristan on Monday night. Local people said the identity of the militants killed in the attack remained unknown but according to unconfirmed reports seven of them were Arabs while the other five from Central Asian."

4. "Operation By Foreign Troops To Be Defied: FO" "The Nation" (01/31)

"Pakistan on Wednesday cautioned against any operation by foreign troops on its soil saying such move would be considered as an enemy act and fully resisted. Foreign Office spokesman Muhammad Sadiq

said at his weekly press briefing in Islamabad. He said there were no US troops in Pakistan adding that Washington had publicly offered to send troops if needed by Pakistan but Pakistan refused."

5. "US Plans To Spend \$2 Billion To Befriend Pakistani Tribesmen" "The News", "The Nation", "Daily Times", "The Post" (01/31)

"The United States this year will start spending in earnest \$750 million where its troops can't go in the hope of making Pakistan's unruly tribal lands less hospitable for Al Qaeda and the Taliban. It the Americans succeed they hope other nations will join them in putting up a total \$2 billion for development and security in Pakistan's semi-autonomous Federally Administered Tribal Areas (FATA) by 2015, a senior US diplomat in Islamabad told journalists."

6. "Lawmakers Urge Bush To Increase Pressure For Fair Polls; Education, Jobs May Make FATA Less Hospitable For Al Qaeda, Taliban" "Dawn" (01/31)

"US lawmakers have urged the Bush administration to increase pressure on the government in Islamabad to ensure free and fair elections in Pakistan. 'We absolutely have a crucial interest in ensuring that the government in Pakistan has the popular mandate to confront extremism and terrorism within its borders,' said Congressman John Tierney, a Massachusetts Democrat. Congressman Chris Shays, another member of the House Oversight and Government Reform Committee, told a hearing that rigging in the February 18 elections could lead to widespread protests and violence in Pakistan."

7. "American Diplomat's Body Flown Home" "The News" (01/31)

"The Capital Police have closed down the caps of Imprican diplomat Keith Ryan, declaring that he committed suicide, in the light of preliminary investigation, sources told "The News."... 'The body has been sent to the US for autopsy and further necessary action,' the SSP Islamabad, Syed Kaleem Imam maintained."

8. "Boucher Defends US Assistance For Pakistan" "The Post" (01/31)

"A senior Bush administration official strongly defended US assistance for Pakistan in socio-economic and counterterrorism fields, citing the South Asian ally's key efforts in the fight against terrorism and a broad-ranging mutually beneficial bilateral relationship. In a congressional testimony, Richard Boucher, assistant secretary of state for South Asia, also renewed US commitment to cooperation in Pakistan's plan for the development of federally administered tribal areas along Afghan border and stressed the US aid will contribute to the country's long-term progress (APP)."

"Government is committed to free and fair elections, the foreign ministry said Wednesday, following remarks by a top US diplomat that next month's vote could be tainted. US Assistant Secretary of State Richard Boucher on Tuesday told a congressional hearing on Pakistan's February 18 elections that some fraud should be expected during polling. Asked about Boucher's comments, Foreign Ministry spokesman Muhammad Sadiq told reporters that there was nothing to say about them as the government had already committed itself to hold fair elections. "I think that is the most important commitment, the government of Pakistan will keep that commitment."

10. "Veteran US Diplomat Sees Post-Poll Crisis" "Dawn" (01/31)

"Pakistan will face yet another crisis if the government refuses to accept the election results or if an opposition-led future government tries to impeach President Musharraf, warns Ambassador Robin Raphel. Mr. Edhi's new green card is valid for only one year, even though normally there is a 10-year limit."

"The fact that in NWFP Pakistan's milliplaty Assistan's to have opted to go in against the militants with full force is a necessary and welcome decision, but it also means more retaliatory strikes could come from the extremists... Involving people in the struggle against extremism, unveiling the still hidden faces of those who are behind the violence we see everywhere, is necessary to finally overcome them. This task is not an easy one. It will take time, effort, and, sadly, more loss of life. But without the support of citizens the struggle may prove a losing one -- and the consequences of this are too terrible even to contemplate. Our armed forces need to think hard how to get the consensus of the people behind them to face this menace. Such a consensus will need rebuilding bridges with the people and civil society throughout the country."
