War on Terrorism dominated headlines, NGLA'SSTFIED reporting on the "Vital Role Played By Pakistan In Anti-Terror Fight" (para 4) to "Nawa-e-Waqt's" commentary on "Coalition Helicopters Violat[ing] Pakistan Airspace 10 Times During 24 Hours." (para 7). Meanwhile, four newspapers printed the text of a re-issued U.S. travel advisory for Pakistan, and two others called it "regrettable." (paras 11-12).

"Dawn" dispelled rumors that Ambassador Crocker had been summoned by the Foreign Office "a day after the U.S. aerial strike in Bajaur Agency." The "U.S. Ambassador himself and officials at the Foreign Ministry" confirmed this. (para 13).

Newspapers also highlighted the visit by four State governors to the earthquake-stricken areas and the U.S. Senate resolution commending U.S. relief efforts and pledges of additional support. (para 16). Leading Urdu dailies "Jang" and "Khabrain" picked up PAS-DAC press releases on "U.S. Relief Operation Continues; Chinook Helicopter Lands At An Altitude Of 5000 Feet" and "Chinook Helicopter Supplied 100,000 Pound Relief Goods To A Snow-Clad Village Bheri." (paras 18-21).

"Khabrain" reports on the "ministers being frisked" during PM Shaukat Aziz's recent U.S. visit -- "As far as we can understand; the fault lay with the Pakistan Embassy more than the U.S. administration as it was the Embassy that worked out the security details with the administration." (para 42).

Other news stories included Hamas' rejection of the call to disarm (para 33), and of the Lahore Marathon where 23,000 people participated despite protest against the participation of women by the opposition Muttahida Majlis-e-Amal. (paras 38-40). End Summary.

1. "Healthy US-Pakistan Relations Stressed: Fight Against Terrorism" "Dawn" (01/29)

"Washington needs a strong and healthy partnership with Pakistan if it is to have any chance of eliminating Qaeda's leaders, defeating a resurgent Taliban and turning back nuclear weapons proliferation," said the New York Times in its lead editorial on Saturday, following Prime Minister Shaukat Aziz's visit to the White House. The Times said: "Pakistan's people deserve

2. "Washington Expanding Plan To Use Drone Attacks" "Dawn" (01/30)

"Despite continued protests in Pakistan against the Jan 13 drone attack in Bajaur, the United States is expanding its top-secret plan to kill suspected terrorists with drone-fired missiles, US officials said.

Commenting on reports published in a section of the US media, the officials said that the CIA and the Pentagon have deployed at least several dozen Predator drones along the Pakistan-Afghan border and throughout Afghanistan and Iraq for attacking suspected terrorist targets."

3. "External Forces Not Allowed To Operate Here: Musharraf: Bajaur Raid: An Issue Of Sovereignty" "Dawn", "Daily Times", "The Post" (01/29)

"President Musharraf has said that Pakistan has condemned the Jan 13 US missile attack on a village in Bajaur Agency as "an issue of sovereignty" and cannot allow any external force to operate within its territory. In a joint interview to Newsweek and Washington Post, to be published on Sunday, Gen Musharraf said that Al Qaeda was as much responsible for violating Pakistan's territorial integrity as any other force. He once again rejected the suggestion that the US had warned Pakistan before the attack. "This was definitely not coordinated with us. We condemn it and have objected to it as an issue of sovereignty," he said. "But we do know there are foreigners and Al Qaeda in that area. It is my regret that there are such people there."

4. "Vital Role Played By Pakistan In Anti-Terror Fight" "Dawn" (01/28)

"President Musharraf on Friday underlined Pakistan's critical role in the fight against terrorism and said the country's sharing of vital intelligence had helped

pre-empt terror attacks in a number MCDUASSFFIED "Pakistan has done much more than people think or even realize. No country has done as much as we have done in countering terrorism," he told a select gathering of intellectuals, journalists and non-government leaders."

5. "We Are Ready To Retreat From Our Stand On Kashmir: Musharraf," "Din" (01/28)

"President Musharraf has said that the Kashmir issue would not be resolved without withdrawing from our stands; Pakistan is ready for it. He added that extremism and terrorism have nothing to do with Islam; the basic reasons [for extremism] are poverty, illiteracy and oppression. He made these remarks yesterday while talking to a panel of journalists at Davos."

6. "American Military Again Reaches Shahbaz Airbase, Security High Alert; Spy Planes Fly All Around" "Nawa-e-Waqt" (01/30)

"Following the completion of construction work at the third largest airbase of the country, American military has once again reached Shahbaz Airbase. According to sources, a contingent of the American military reached Jacobabad on a special plane. It is said that the contingent includes 40-50 personnel including women commandoes. According to sources, the military's second group would reach Jacobabad in the last week of February. Security around the airbase has been raised to high alert and the military has put in the air a pilotless, remote controlled spy plane for its security, which is hovering around the base.... Jacobabad Base

Commander, when contacted, said that the U.S. military hasn't arrived at the base as yet, but it will arrive in few days time."

7. "Coalition Helicopters Violate Pakistan Airspace 10 Times During 24 Hours" "Nawa-e-Waqt" (01/30)

"Coalition helicopters repeatedly violated Pakistan airspace in the area of Lowaramandi, Dattakhel, North Waziristan. Many rounds of artillery were also fired from across the border. No loss of life and property was reported. Local officials avoided to comment on these violations. Locals of the area told our correspondent that two military helicopters violated Pakistan airspace approximately 10 times during the last

24 hours and continued with their set (ASSIFED) Many rounds of artillery were also fired into Pakistan territory from Afghanistan, which landed in Adamkot area."

8. "US Copter Warned For Violating Airspace" "Dawn", "Daily Times", "The News" (01/30)

"Pakistan had to warn off an American helicopter which violated its airspace above its northern border with Afghanistan, the military said on Sunday. "It was a technical violation," Pakistani military spokesman Major General Shaukat Sultan told AFP of the incident which happened on Friday night during US anti-insurgent operations in eastern Afghanistan. "After warnings from Pakistan side the helicopter went back," he said."

9. "Our Sovereignty And Nuclear Program Are U.S. Targets: We Can't Be Its Natural Ally: Qazi Hussain Ahmed" "Nawa-e-Waqt" (01/30)

"MMA head and Jamaat-e-Islami Amir Qazi Hussain Ahmed has reminded the rulers 'busy in the fulfillment of U.S. designs' that our sovereignty and nuclear program are U.S. targets and India's strategic partner which has declared it as the most favorite nation can never be our friend. General Musharraf and his government's policy of describing Pakistan as the frontline state of America has failed. American president has openly said that the Islamic states of the world are our target. We are an Islamic democracy constitutionally, ideologically and historically and can't be America's natural ally. He was talking to Nawa-e-Waqt the other day."

10. "Usama Six Months Ahead Of US Intelligence" "The Nation" (01/28)

"Constantly on the run, the elusive Al-Qaeda Chief Usama bin Laden and his top aide Ayman Al-Zawahiri are at least six months ahead of US intelligence apparatus as for the information about their exact location, and this is the main reason of their survival so far. The CIA is dead sure that bin Laden and his Deputy Al- Zawahiri are roaming about Pak-Afghan border areas since the fall of Taliban government back in 2001.... If the United States wants to capture or kill the Al-Qaeda leaders they would have to bridge this wide gap in the intelligence information, intelligence official said here.

11. "US Travel Advisory" "Dawn", "The Nation", "Daily

Times", "The News" (01/29)

"The US has cautioned its citizens to defer nonessential travel to Pakistan. Updating a March 2005 travel advisory, the State Department said Al Qaeda and Taliban militants, particularly along the porous Afghan border region, and other indigenous sectarian groups posed 'potential danger' to US citizens. The US embassy in Islamabad and consulates in Karachi, Lahore, and Peshawar continue to operate at reduced staffing levels."

12. "Asking American Citizens To Avoid Coming To Pakistan Regrettable: Shaikh Rashid" "Nawa-e-Waqt", "Ummat" (01/30)

"Federal Information Minister Sheikh Rashid has said that U.S. Department of State travel warning against American citizens travel to Pakistan is regrettable. This restriction on the travel has been imposed at a time when U.S. President Bush is about to visit Pakistan. It is noteworthy that American hospitals and NGOs are working here."

13. "US Envoy Not Summoned By Foreign Office Over Raid" "Dawn" (01/28)

"Contrary to earlier reports that US Ambassador Ryan C. Crocker was summoned by the Foreign Office on January 14, a day after the US aerial strike in Bajaur Agency, it has now been established that he was not. This has been confirmed by the US Ambassador himself and officials at the Foreign Ministry. It was not the Foreign Office but at the PM House that Foreign Secretary Riaz Mohammad Khan raised the matter with the US Ambassador.... Foreign Ministry officials say that Ambassador Crocker was supposed to be summoned to the Foreign Office the same evening but this did not happen due to a scheduling problem."

14. "US Governors Visit Quake-Hit Areas" "The Post" (01/28)

"A delegation of four US State governors led by Governor Rick Perry of Texas witnessed earthquake relief efforts at Mehra camp in Allai valley. Accompanied by Governors Mike Huckabee of Arkansas, Jim Doyle of Wisconsin and Dave Freudenthal of Wyoming, Perry and the delegation spoke with Pakistani officials at the camp."

15. "Congress Allows Pentagon To Gine GraASS FreeDly To Foreign Militaries," "Jang" (01/30)

"Congress has allowed Pentagon to disburse grants directly to foreign militaries and has allocated an amount of 200 million dollars for the purpose in the FY-2006 budget. Earlier, all grants were channeled through the U.S. State Department to the foreign governments. U.S. Defense Secretary Donald Rumsfeld believes that in order to seek foreign militaries' cooperation in war on terror it was imperative that the U.S. military commanders directly provided funds to their foreign military counterparts."

16. "US Pledges More Assistance For Quake-Hit Areas" "Daily Times", "The News" (01/29)

"The US Senate passed a resolution on Friday commending the US relief efforts in response to the October 8

earthquake and pledged additional support to Pakistan. Adopted unanimously, the resolution urged commitment by the United States and the international community to support long-term relief and reconstruction efforts in the quake-affected areas."

17. "Christianity Is Being Spread In Quake Hit Areas: Maulana Fazalur Rehman Says" "Ausaf" (01/30)

"... Maulana Fazalur Rehman, the leader of MMA (the alliance of the religious parties) has said that the Government is spreading immodesty in the society in the garb of enlightenment and the marathon race held in Lahore, despite opposition from the religious parities was aimed to spread chaos and disorder in the society. Talking to a delegation at his residence in Dera Ismail Khan, Fazalur Rehman said that the religious parties are treated as fanatics, however Christians and followers of other religions are being allowed to flourish in Pakistan. He claimed that Christianity is being propagated overtly in the quake-hit areas of Pakistan...."

18. "Relief Work For Quake Affected People Is A Service To Humanity: U.S. Commander Gary Krichner Says" "Jang" (01/28)

"... U.S. Commander Gary Krichner has said that the U.S. considers Pakistan as its friend and we will continue to provide assistance to Pakistan as long the

Government of Pakistan wants us to ENGLASSIFIED exclusive interview with this newspaper, Gary Krichner said that 760 American military officers and soldiers were taking part in this humanitarian task...."

19. "Seven Hours Daily Flights Of Twelve Chinook Helicopters To Quake Affected Areas" "Khabrain" (01/28)

"... The U.S. pilots have said that they are taking part in relief operation in quake-hit areas only to support a humanitarian cause. U.S. pilots Robert and Ms. Anne told this newspaper that they are impressed with the zest of the Pakistani people who have lost everything in the earthquake but they are working hard to bring their lives back to normal. They said that twelve U.S. Chinooks are taking part in relief work at the moment and theyfly seven hours on a daily basis...."

20. "Chinook Helicopter Supplied 100,000 Pound Relief Goods To A Snow-Clad Village Bheri" "Khabrain" (01/28)

"... The U.S. Chinook helicopters had moved 100,000 pounds relief goods to a snow-clad village Bheri. This helicopter made ten sorties to the area...." (Khabrain has also carried several photographs on U.S. relief operation. This visit was arranged by PAS-DAC)

21. "U.S. Relief Operation Continues; Chinook Helicopter Lands At An Altitude Of 5000 Feet" "Jang" (01/28)

"... The U.S. helicopters are continuing the airlifts to Neelum valley even during a below freezing temperature. On January 27, a reporter of this newspaper spent a day in a Chinook helicopter with a U.S. pilot who was busy in the relief operation. The

American pilot made 10 sorties without taking any rest and moved flour-bags to quake affected area of Bheri. Talking to this reporter the U.S. pilot Robert said that he was happy to work for the Pakistani brothers...." (Daily Jang has also published two photographs of American pilots. The visit was arranged by PAS-DAC)

22. "USAID Teaching Women Sewing In Quake-Hit Areas" "Daily Times" (01/29)

"In response to the need for skilled seamstresses in Allai Valley, the United States Agency for International

Development (USAID) is training women to ASSEW ED the newly established vocational center at Mehra Camp. USAID has purchased sewing machines and started training 20 of the 1,060 women living in the camp. Two local seamstresses were hired by the USAID to give the training. Families in Allai Valley cannot easily purchase ready-made clothes or bedding, instead most of the families purchase cloth and then hire a seamstress to stitch it. Unfortunately, only a few skilled seamstresses exist in the region, creating a high demand."

23. "Pakistan Needs To Improve Health Care: US Official" "Daily Times" (01/28)

"Pakistan needs better medical and health care, Brian Heath, Principal Officer at the US Consulate in Lahore, told a ceremony to celebrate the New Year at the United Christian Hospital (UCH) on Friday. Heath, who was the chief guest at the function, praised missionary services in medical health in Pakistan, but said that Pakistan still needed improvement in health care."

24. "U.S. Congressman Asks Bush To Raise Balochistan Issue During His Forthcoming Visit To Pakistan," "Jang" (01/29)

"U.S. Congressman Tankerado (sp?) has expressed his concern over the situation in Balochistan. In his letter to the U.S. Secretary of State Condoleeza Rice, he stressed that President Bush should raise the issue with his Pakistani counterpart during his visit to Pakistan. He said that militant resistance could not be ignored at any cost nor the use of force would bring about any solution. The Republican member underlined the need for holding negotiations for arriving at a solution to the problem."

25. "Attack On Iran An Option: Bush" "Daily Times" (01/29)

"US President George W Bush said on Friday that sanctions against Iran were "certainly a real possibility" if Tehran does not do enough to ease fears that it is trying to develop nuclear weapons. "A free world cannot allow Iran to have a nuclear weapon; not just the US, but those of us who value freedom," Bush told CBS television in an interview."

26. "Iran Warns Of Missile Response If Attacked" "The

News", Daily Times" (01/29) UNCLASSIFIED

"Iran's Revolutionary Guards chief on Saturday warned the United States and Britain that the Islamic republic would respond with its missiles if attacked, a clear

threat to Israel which lies within easy range of such a launch. "The world knows Iran has a ballistic missile power with a range of 2,000 kilometers," General Yahya Rahim Safavi said on state-run television. "We have no intention to invade any country. We will take effective defense measures if attacked," he said, adding, "These missiles are in the possession of the Guards."

"India Faced With 'Difficult Choices' On N-Deal: 27. Rice" "Daily Times", "The News", "The Nation", "The Post" (01/28)

"India has "difficult choices" to make on a controversial civil nuclear cooperation agreement with the United States before the deal can be completed, US Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice said on Thursday. "In order to move on to a new phase in which civil nuclear power would be available to India, India has to make some difficult choices," Rice said in an interview with Reuters."

28. "India Changes Tune, Defends Iran" "Dawn" (01/28)

"India on Friday distanced itself from US-led calls to isolate Iran at next week's meeting of the IAEA after controversial remarks on the issue by Washington's envoy to Delhi enraged the nation as seldom seen before. The Indian foreign ministry, facing a barrage of criticism for apparent obsequiousness towards Washington that ranged from allies in the Left Front to former prime minister Atal Behari Vajpayee, appeared to have rowed back from its recent bonhomie with the United States."

"India N-Deal May Not Be Ready For Bush Visit" "The 29. Nation", "Jang" (01/29)

"The United States indicated Friday that a controversial civilian nuclear agreement with India might not be ready by the time US President George W. Bush makes his first visit to New Delhi in March.

"It's very hard to say," Nicholas Burns, the Chief US negotiator of the deal, told reporters in Washington, when asked how far along would the landmark bilateral pact be when Bush made the trip."

"Pipeline Plan May Be Delayed" "Dawn" (01/29)

"Pakistan is facing difficulties to go ahead with the Iran-Pakistan-India (IPI) gas pipeline project due to the mounting US pressure on Islamabad and New Delhi to give up the over \$7 billion plan. 32. "MMA Rally Demands Musharraf's Resignation" "The News" (01/28)

"Muthidda Majlis-e-Amal (MMA) leaders on Friday demanded resignation of President Musharraf for what they said his failure to protect Pakistan's national interests. "We will start military disobedience if General Musharraf does not resign as President and Army Chief," MMA leaders announced while addressing a protest demonstration outside Parliament House on Friday. The protest demonstration held to condemn US planes attack in Bajaur Agency.... Hafiz Hussain Ahmed said that Pakistan government should expel the US Ambassador call back its Ambassador from Washington, which is an effective way of registering protest with the US government.... Qari Gull Rahman said that the rulers were agents of US saying that body search of Cabinet members during recent visit of Prime Minister Shaukat Aziz to US was humiliating and embarrassment for the nation."

33. "Hamas Rejects Call To Disarm, Roadmap" "The Post" (01/28)

"Palestinian leader Mahmud Abbas announced on Friday that he would ask Hamas to form a new government after its overwhelming election victory.... Exiled Hamas leader Khaled Meshaal rejected suggestions the radical group should disarm following its shock victory in Palestinian elections, in an interview with an Italian

newspaper published Friday.... "The NGL ASSIFIED unacceptable," Meshaal told the daily La Repubblica, saying it imposed strict conditions on the Palestinians while asking too little of Israel.... The diplomatic "quartet" seeking to implement the "road map" - the United States, European Union, Russia and the United Nations - has called on Hamas to reject violence and accept Israel's right to exist.... A senior US diplomat in Jerusalem said his country would have to freeze millions of dollars in aid to the Palestinian Authority if a Hamas-led government comes to power and refuses to renounce terror."

34. "Hamas May Evolve As Peace Champion: Musharraf" "The News" (01/28)

"President Musharraf on Friday said the world must give Hamas a chance to show if it can transform itself like Israeli Prime Minister Ariel Sharon into a force for peace. "Everyone thought he (Sharon) was a military man, a strongman, that he's the one who was destroying peace. But as it developed, it ended up as if he was the only hope of peace in that region," Musharraf told journalists after giving a speech at the European Organization for Nuclear Research. "Let us hope that Hamas also ends up like that." Musharraf said Hamas needed to be given a chance because it was democratically elected. "Otherwise democracy will become a farce," said Musharraf. "If you deny them this, you will end up in more turmoil." Hamas, for its part, "must be made to behave in a correct manner," he said. But if the group continues to espouse violence, the world should try to exert pressure without embarking on "a confrontational course."

35. "Qazi Welcomes Victory of Hamas In Palestine Election" "The News" (01/28)

"Amir Jamaat-e-Islami and President Muthidda Majlis-e-Amal, Qazi Hussain Ahmad has welcomed election victory

of Palestinian militant group, Hamas, and demanded earlier transformation of power to the party. He was addressing Juma congregation at Markaz-e-Islami on Friday. He said the US has started creating hurdles in transformation of power to the Hamas and demanded of the Islamic community to foil nefarious designs of the US government. Qazi said the US on charges of terrorism has been killing innocent Muslims all over the world and a recent aerial strike on Bajaur tribal agency was a

clear proof of its barbarism."

36. "Constitution Allows '08 Polls'" "The Nation" (01/28)

"PML President Chaudhry Shujaat Hussain has said that though room exists in the Constitution for holding of general election in 2008, the ruling party is yet to take a decision in this respect. "It is premature to say something about holding of next general election in 2008 next," the PML President said in a brief chat with media-men."

37. "OIC Formulating New Criteria For Non-Muslim Countries" "Daily Times" (01/28)

"Organization of Islamic Conference (OIC) is working to formulate new criteria for embracing non-Muslim countries with sizeable Muslim population as observers. However, the officials said at present there was no fresh request before the OIC Secretariat to grant observer status to India.... "Tehrik-e-Insaf (PTI) Chairman Imran Khan said Sunday the purpose of holding marathon race in Pakistan was only to please the US and to give an impression to the West that incumbent government was giving no importance to the religious organizations. He stated this while addressing local and foreign journalists on the occasion of giving shelter homes to the quake survivors in Balakot."

39. "Ethiopian Athlete Wins; MMA Loses, The Public Has Won The Marathon: CM Punjab Pervaiz Elahi," "Khabrain" (01/30)

"Punjab Chief Minister Pervaiz Elahi has said that the administration, police and citizens deserve praise for the successful completion of the mixed Lahore Marathon 2006. He said that the crowds of families and the warm welcome of runners along the route has proven the public wants healthy activities."
