INVESTIGATIVE SUMMARY:

About 1738, 23 Jun 04, MAJ b7C-3, b6-3 [REDACTED] B Company (CO) William

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Beaumont Army Medical Center (WBAMC), Fort Bliss, TX (FBTX) notified this office one of his counselors, Ms. [REDACTED] b7C-4, b6-4 Contractor, [REDACTED] b7C-4, b6-4 Professional Performance Development Group, San Antonio, TX, informed him SPC [REDACTED] b7C-4, b6-4 told her he abused Iraqi detainees.

Investigation established probable cause to believe SPC [REDACTED] b7C-5, b6-5 committed the offense of False Official Statement when he stated he did not tell Ms. [REDACTED] b7C-4, b6-4 he killed and abused Iraqi detainees, a statement he knew to be false.

Investigation revealed the offense of murder did not occur as alleged. It was determined SPC [REDACTED] b7C-4, b6-4 made the story up involving the abuse of Iraqi detainees as additional interviews did not corroborate his claims nor were there any deaths during the time frame of the claims which supported the allegation.

abused Iraqi detainees.

About 1800, 23 Jun 04, SA [REDACTED] b7C-1, b6-1 telephonically interviewed Ms. [REDACTED] b7C-4, b6-4
who stated she had counseled SPC [REDACTED] on three occasions. Ms. [REDACTED] b7C-4, b6-4
stated the first was when he first returned from Iraq and in-processed her
station, the second time was 22 Jun 04, in the break area when SPC [REDACTED] b7C-5, b6-5
told her he needed to make an appointment with her because he wanted to
speak to her. Ms. [REDACTED] b7C-4, b6-4 stated an appointment was made for 1500, 23 Jun
04. Ms. [REDACTED] b7C-5, b6-5 related she and SPC [REDACTED] spoke awhile about why he was so
angry and during their conversation she asked SPC [REDACTED] "If you had to
think of the worst experience in Iraq, what would it be?" SPC [REDACTED] b7C-5, b6-5
reported two experiences; the first was when he was in a vehicle and an
Iraqi soldier threw a child into the road so his vehicle could run over
the child, and the second was when SPC [REDACTED] b7C-5, b6-5 had to care for Iraqi
prisoners. Ms. [REDACTED] b7C-4, b6-4 stated SPC [REDACTED] was assigned to care for Iraqi
prisoners and SPC [REDACTED] was angry towards them because he could remember a
time when he had to use six pints of blood on an Iraqi soldier and there
were times when there was not enough blood for American Soldiers. Ms.
[REDACTED] b7C-5, b6-5 stated SPC [REDACTED] told her there were several occasions in which SPC
[REDACTED] placed bleach into Iraqi soldiers IV's, and also intentionally cut
arteries of the Iraqi soldiers to make them bleed out. Ms. [REDACTED] b7C-4, b6-4 further
stated SPC [REDACTED] told her when he was told to feed the prisoners, he would
spit in their food and those soldiers who were under his care received
death certificates stating they died because of their injuries, not
because other circumstances. Ms. [REDACTED] b7C-4, b6-4 stated SPC [REDACTED] b7C-5, b6-5 told her he
would also punch prisoners when they told him they wanted to sleep in and
on one occasion, a sergeant once caught him punching a prisoner. Ms.
[REDACTED] b7C-4, b6-4 stated SPC [REDACTED] b7C-5, b6-5 told her the sergeant took him aside and told him
his behavior was wrong and because of that he was later transferred to the
emergency room (ER) unit and then was later moved to be someone's driver.
Ms. [REDACTED] b7C-5, b6-5 stated SPC [REDACTED] told her he knew of other Soldiers who where
also mistreating the prisoners, but no one did anything as bad as he did
and they had an agreement of whatever happens in Iraq stays in Iraq. Ms.

b7C-4, b6-4 related SPC b7C-5, b6-5 told her he was not lying to her but if she told anyone, he would deny it. Ms. b7C-4, b6-4 stated SPC b7C-5, b6-5 had been back from Iraq for about two weeks and was redeployed because he was getting out of the Army. Ms. b7C-4, b6-4 related the day she spoke to SPC b7C-5, b6-5 was his second day back to the Labor and Deliver Unit. Ms. b7C-4, b6-4 stated she finally terminated the session about 1625, 23 Jun 04. Ms. b7C-4, b6-4 stated SPC b7C-5, b6-5 was insistent on whether or not she was going to report their conversation. Ms. b7C-4, b6-4 stated SPC b7C-5, b6-5 told her he did not want his chain of command to know what he told her.

About 1220, 24 Jun 04, SA b7C-1, b6-1 interviewed CPT b7C-4, b6-4 A CO, WBAMC, FBTX, who stated she spoke with SPC b7C-5, b6-5 on several occasions since his return. CPT b7C-4, b6-4 stated he was not a problem soldier and she was told by his old commander, CPT b7C-4, b6-4 A CO, 31st CSH, FBTX, he was a good Soldier that was never in trouble. CPT b7C-4, b6-4 stated she left Iraq in Oct 03, prior to SPC b7C-5, b6-5 arriving there and while she was working in the same area as SPC b7C-5, b6-5 later worked in, b7C-5, b6-5 there was no access to bleach. CPT b7C-5, b6-5 stated shortly after SPC b7C-5, b6-5 returned from Iraq, SPC b7C-5, b6-5 told her he was not comfortable conducting patient care at the Labor Deliver unit and wanted to be transferred. CPT b7C-5, b6-5 stated she told him to take leave and to plan on going back to work upon his return. CPT b7C-5, b6-5 stated she also told him there were a lot of resources available for him to talk to someone. CPT b7C-5, b6-5 stated she saw SPC b7C-5, b6-5 on his first day back from work and SPC b7C-5, b6-5 told her he might need talk to someone and she told him to just let her know and she would take care of it. CPT b7C-5, b6-5 related she did not refer SPC b7C-5, b6-5 to Ms. b7C-4, b6-4 and she did not know he went to talk to her until after the fact. CPT b7C-5, b6-5 further stated SPC b7C-5, b6-5 possible duties while deployed were checking vital signs, turning the individuals, changing IV's, and stocking.

About 1410, 24 Jun 04, SA b7C-1, b6-1 advised SPC b7C-5, b6-5 of his legal rights which he waived rendering a sworn statement denying he killed or harmed any Iraqi detainees' under his care. (See Waiver Certificate and Sworn Statement for details)

I want to make the following Statement under oath:
I deployed with 31st Combat Support Hospital, FBTX, in 07 Jan 04. Half of our unit was sent to Baghdad and the other half went to Balad, Iraq. I arrived to Balad, Iraq on 17 Jan 04, and was assigned to the Intensive Care Ward (ICW) there were two wards. ICW 1, was for American, and ICW 2 was for EPWs and for Iraqi civilians that we injured. Both wards dealt with the walking wounded, minimal care patients, which could walk talk and feed themselves. They were usually just taking antibiotics and most of them were there from IED attacks, convoy attacks, self inflicted gun shot wounds. The EPW's were waiting to be released to the prisons. My job when I first arrived to the unit was to sweep, mop, take out trash, and keep things stocked. The only personnel that tended to the patients were the registered nurses and Licensed Vocational Nurses (LVN). As more patients came in I was given more responsibilities. On my last week there I was trained on dressing changes, IV's, and blood draws that were all supervised by LVN or RNs. In a normal hospital setting I would have been doing all of that. A week later I was moved to be CPT [REDACTED] b7C-5, b6-4
[REDACTED] Commander, B Co 31st CSH, driver. I was her driver until I left on 31 May 04. I never went into the hospital again, just to eat.

Q: SA [REDACTED] b7C-1, b6-1

A: SPC [REDACTED] b7C-5, b6-5

Q: Did SA [REDACTED] type the above statement in your own words?

A: Yes. [REDACTED] b7C-1, b6-1

Q: What is your MOS?

A: 91 W Combat Medic.

Q: What type of training have you received?

A: I have received my MOS training, hospital trauma life support, trauma aimes, stable course in transitioning newborns, neonatal resuscitation program provider, CPR, and EMT basic.

Q: What job were you doing prior to your deployment?

A: I worked for the labor and delivery unit.

Q: How long have you been a medic?

A: Three years.

Q: What type of security was in place for the EPW's?

A: There was one MP on shift at all times on the Ward always watching them and escorting them.

Q: What type of EPWs were on the ward?

A: They had one MP guarding 30 of them. The MP's escorted them to the restroom. They were usually in bed or walking around doing physical

therapy. They were minimal risk.

Q: Did you have direct access to the EPW's?

A: Not without supervision of the RN or MP.

Q: Did you have any dealings with the EPW's?

A: No, the only thing I did was start a heplock for medication administration to one EPW.

Q: How is a heplock administered?

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A: Intravenously just like an IV but with no fluid or tubing.

Q: What is a heplock?

A: Is a catheter inserted intravenously to the patient that gives us direct access to the vein for medication and floods.

Q: Did you ever hurt the EPW's in anyway?

A: No.

Q: Did the EPW's hurt you in anyway?

A: No.

Q: Did you see any maltreatment from any other personnel toward the EPW's?
A: No, just raised voices out of frustration and the language barrier. We did not understand anything they said. We had translators available but we had to wait for them because they would usually be in the ER or OR.

Q: Why did you not want to deal with the EPW's?

A: Because I had knowledge of what they did to American soldiers and I saw the result of their work, i.e American bodies. That made me think they did not deserve our care but in agreement with the Geneva Convention I treated them anyways.

Q: Did you have access to bleach?

A: No, but later on in the deployment when I worked with CPT [REDACTED] we got in a lot of bleach and that is what we would mop our floors with.

Q: Did you ever inject bleach into the prisoners IV's?

A: No, for my time in the ICW I only started 1 IV.

Q: How long did you work in the ICW?

A: A month.

Q: Which ICW did you work in?

A: We alternated from both every other day.

Q: What was your schedule like?

A: I work six days a week twelve hour shifts and one day on call.

Q: Why did you leave the ICW?

A: I was reassigned to be the commanders driver, in which I volunteered for.

Q: Why did you volunteer to be the driver?

A: I was looking for a way out of patient care and a less stressful job. I noticed the commander didn't have a driver and asked CPT [REDACTED] if she needed one.

Q: Where is CPT [REDACTED]

A: She is still the commander in Iraq.

Q: What bothered you about patient care?

A: It was the people I was working with and the lack of respect we got from these EPW's that made we look for another environment.

Q: What was wrong with the people you worked with?

A: They were all brand new nurses in the army and at times I felt talked down to. These new nurses never realized how valuable combat medics are, they just thought that we were janitors.

Q: How were you disrespected by the EPW's?

A: When they asked for water, we would bring it to them, if it wasn't cold they would throw it at us. The EPW's would defecate on the floor knowing that we would have to clean it, and they would use vulgar Muslim gestures. For example, showing us the soles of their feet, or wiggling their middle finger, and use Arabic bad words, like "Manooch and nietch", Bitch and Dog.

Q: Did you have any dealings with the ER personnel?

A: A lot of my friends worked there, but I hardly had the chance to visit.

Q: Did you ever work in the ER?

A: No.

Q: Did you punch any of the prisoners?

A: No.

Q: How long have you been back from Iraq?

A: Two weeks. On 24 Jun 04, was my second day back to work. I work in the labor and delivery unit.

Q: Did you ask to be moved from the labor and delivery section?

A: I have been away from patient care for 7 months, I didn't want my lack of practice in the delivery room/operating room to cause injury to anyone of our patients. I don't feel my skills are up to par to assist or handle any emergencies.

Q: When Mrs. [REDACTED] asked you, "If you had to think of your worst experience in Iraq what was it?" what did you respond?

A: Thinking that I would never see my wife and child again. I would end up like all the young dead soldiers that were wheeled through our doors.

Q: What did you tell Mrs. [REDACTED] about a convoy? 67C-4, 66-4

A: I was coming back from pass in Qatar along with new soldiers sent from Baghdad to Balad, Iraq. I was in the back of a 5-ton when I saw the body of a small body that resembled a child rolling down the highway and getting run over by the oncoming traffic.

Q: Did you see who threw the body?

A: No, the people who briefed us before the convoy told us that human shields are what they use to stop the convoys and attack us.

Q: Who is they?

A: The Iraqi Freedom Fighters or Saddam Loyalist.

Q: Who ran over the body?

A: A huge 18 wheel vehicle with trailers attached.

Q: Did you see the vehicle stop?

A: No.

Q: Was the vehicle military or civilian?

A: Civilian carrying trailers.

Q: Do you know who was driving the 18 wheel truck?

A: He looked Indian and was probably a contract worker because they are hired to drive for the US. He was driving in the middle lane. He did not stop and they are taught not to stop for anything.

Q: What road did this occur?

A: I do not know the specific road.

Q: Who ran over the body first?

A: I do not know the traffic was really heavy. I just saw us pass the body that was rolling in the middle lane. I saw the truck run over the body. I could not stare because I was pulling security scanning roof tops, and crowds.

A: I am so happy to be home and see my family healthy and well. I am ready to exit the army knowing I served proudly and accomplished everything sent my way. I am ready to move on and finish my goals.

Q: How about stress and anger?

A: I really did not start thinking about it until Mrs. [REDACTED] started asking me. 67C-4, 66-4

Q: How were you first referred to Mrs. [REDACTED] 67C-4, 66-4

A: CPT [REDACTED] let me know she was available and Mrs. [REDACTED] let me know if I ever wanted to talk that she was available. 67C-4, 66-4

Q: How did you obtain an appointment with her on 23 Jun 04?

A: I called her the morning of 23 Jun 04, left a message and she called me back and told me to come in at 1430, 23 Jun 04.

Q: Why did you call Mrs. [REDACTED] and ask for an appointment? 67C-4, 66-4

A: I first met her at my post-deployment interview with her that is part of my inprocessing into the hospital, I was told by the first sergeant that I could not go on leave until I spoke to her. I talked to her and she told me if I ever just wanted to talk to call her. I was feeling secluded and a bit lonely, so I went to speak to her. I was feeling lonely that day because I missed all my friends in Iraq and I felt like a stranger in WBAMC. I missed my wife and baby and just felt out of place to be here alone.

Q: Where you told by your supervisors that you should see someone at mental health?

A: No, the way I interact with my peers is normal and I feel normal talking to them.

Q: Why do you think Mrs. [REDACTED] misinterpreted what you told her? 67C-4, 66-4

A: In my opinion, I believe that the discussion between myself and Mrs. [REDACTED] was misunderstood. I was very emotional during our conversation and I was never asked my feelings or outlook on anything since my return to the United States. I took the first open ear offered and opened up the emotional floodgates of my mind and heart to her. I believe with all my ideas and feelings I never distinguished what was a feeling or action. After telling Mrs. [REDACTED] all that I felt and experienced in Iraq she offered no guidance or feedback on what I could do or who I could see for further guidance, only that she would consult with her supervisor. I felt that there was a conflict in our communication and our understanding of the content of our discussion. I feel that the lack of knowledge about the army and little understanding of what our soldiers do everyday in Iraq/Afghanistan lead Mrs. [REDACTED] to misunderstand or confuse the information I provided her with. I also think that it was my emotion and frustration that caused me to be non-specific (in that I mean not distinguishing between feelings dreams and actions) although Mrs. [REDACTED] hardly had any type of feedback. It is my belief that we should provide our soldiers with experienced counselors that understand a deployed soldiers stress and frustration in order to best aid the soldier for his 67C-4, 66-4

I am hopeful the hospital will provide my friends coming home soon with experienced counselors that have been through combat and coped with their transition to normal everyday life.

Q: What did you tell Mrs. [REDACTED] during your session with her? 67C-4, b6-4

A: I told her about some of my bad dreams and my feelings about working with the EPW's. I told her that I hated working for them and I hated the things they did to the soldiers everyday, I told her all the built up frustration and anger I had built up for the EPW's while working on the floor. I was just happy to be home.

Q: What are some of the bad dreams?

A: Mainly being killed by a mortar, I also have dreams of my friends being killed my mortars over there.

Q: Did you tell Mrs. [REDACTED] you put bleach in the EPW's IV's? 67C-4, b6-4

A: I told her that I dreamt of doing harm to these people, and I told her I wanted to put bleach in the IV bags of the EPW's.

I, [REDACTED], want to make the following Statement under oath: On or about 1510 hours, on 23 June 2004, in my office at WBAMC, I met with SPC [REDACTED], as a Deployment Social Work Care Manager for a screening interview. I explained to him that he had been referred to me because there were concerns from his department about him since his return from Iraq. I asked SPC [REDACTED] to explain what the concerns were about. He stated that he had been having difficulty sleeping and was having bad dreams. He also stated that he noticed that he was more short-tempered. I inquired about his leave to San Antonio, which took place a few weeks ago, he stated that it had gone well and that he had enjoyed seeing his wife and 1 year old daughter. We talked about his leave home, he stated his wife had commented that he had returned from Iraq more willing to help her and accommodating. I inquired about his sleep and SPC [REDACTED] stated that he was getting very little sleep and even while in San Antonio he had experienced poor sleep as well as bad dreams. I inquired about the dreams and he spoke briefly about associating these with mortar attacks. I then asked SPC [REDACTED] to identify what his worst experience had been in Iraq and he stated that there were actually two experiences in two separate areas. I asked him to talk about these and he stated that the first was being in a vehicle where two people sat up front, another sat in the middle and two in the back, he stated that he was behind the driver with his rifle scanning the road. He stated that an Iraqi jumped out by the road and threw a child about eight years of age in front of their vehicle. He stated that the vehicle felt as if it was going over a speed bump and when he looked back he realized that they had run over the child and the vehicles behind him were also running over the child. He went on to talk about how heartless and inhumane the Iraqis were and how angry this made him feel. He stated that Iraqis did not hesitate to use women and children as weapons. He expressed anger that this was being done. At this time, SPC [REDACTED] expression became somewhat fixed as if in thought, I asked him what he was thinking and he stated that was remembering what he had seen and what he had experienced. I asked SPC [REDACTED] to tell me what his second worst experience had been and he stated that it had been taking care of Iraqi EPW'S who were at the hospital. He talked about his anger of having to take care of these prisoners and stated that blood supplies were used for the EPW's which angered him because at times there was not sufficient blood to provide to the injured US soldiers. He gave an example about a US soldier needing A+ blood. He stated he is the same blood type and stated he donated three to four units and in the end he was very dizzy but was glad that he was able to this. SPC [REDACTED] again talked about his anger at Iraqi's then he went on to state that he would get back at them by hitting them, placing bleach in their IV's, and cutting arteries in open wounds in such a way that

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they would bleed out. Then he and others would state it was a bleed-out but provide care in such a way that was not prompt and eventually the patients' would bleed out. He stated that several Iraqi soldiers had died yet their deaths could not be traced to anything he did and all were certified as related to their injuries. SPC [REDACTED] stated he had never talked to anyone about this but was doing it because he felt comfortable. We discussed confidentiality and it's limits. We also discussed how this could be similar to the other abuses that had surfaced with Prisoners of War. SPC [REDACTED] inquired who I would be expected to share this with. I stated that this would be discussed with my supervisor who would provide clinical supervision in regards as how to proceed with this. SPC [REDACTED] expressed concern that his chain of command would be notified. I stated that I would only speak to my supervisor who was MAJ [REDACTED] and he would advise what steps if any would be taken. Yet that once I did this if any steps had to be taken it would be out of my hands. SPC [REDACTED] then returned to stating that other soldiers were also involved in this type of treatment toward the EPW's, however he had done the most serious harm. He said they knew he was the worst. He stated that he often had to wake up the EPW's in the morning and when they would tell him no he would react by hitting them. He stated that the day before he was moved and transferred from this unit, his SGT had caught him being abusive towards a prisoner and had pulled him outside and reprimanded him. He told this SGT that he had made it quite clear that he had a difficult time taking care of EPW's and was glad to be transferred. He stated the next day he was transferred to the Emergency Room. SPC [REDACTED] stated that he and the other soldiers were aware of what was going on but had agreed that nothing would be shared with others and that it would remain in Iraq. He gave an example stating, "it is just like what happens in Las Vegas, stays in Las Vegas." After he said that I told him that I would not have known any different if he would have come into my office and just told me a story. I then asked him why he confided in me he said that I was easy to talk to and I reminded him of his sister. SPC [REDACTED] stated he was assigned to the ER but still had difficulty interacting with soldiers and eventually he was transferred to be the driver for a commander. He stated that he did this the remaining of the time that he was in Iraq and he thought this would be an easy job, possibly sitting behind a desk and going out occasionally but found out that they had to do several runs a day. He stated he was glad to be back in the US in one piece. At this time it was 4:01 p.m., I stated that I would have to end the session, because I had to be elsewhere for an appointment. I asked him to reschedule and that I would meet with my supervisor. SPC [REDACTED] then began to inquire what was going to happen and I stated I didn't know. I told him that I would speak to my supervisor, he stated that if anyone inquired about this he would deny it. I stated that was an option, but my concern was for his well-being and how he would handle knowing that he had done this and that the nightmares indicated that something was causing him to be uneasy. He stated that he had no regret about what he had done. At some point I inquired if he practiced a religion, he stated yes, that it was "Jasso-ology," I asked what this was and he stated it was his own religion and that he knew he would be fine with God and when he reached heaven God would understand why he had done this and would welcome him with open arms. I inquired about how he was doing in his current position in Labor and Delivery. He stated that he had been on the job two days but he had not had patient contact and was

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purposely staying away from patients because he did not feel comfortable being in the room with them. He stated that yesterday he was asked to assist in a delivery, but refused because he did not feel comfortable. He stated that the unit was being flexible with him regarding this apprehension and that so far they were working with him. He denied being homicidal, suicidal or abusive to anyone. He stated he was aware of the reasons of why confidentiality could not be kept and that he was not experiencing any of these. He also stated that he just wanted to be out of the Army and this would occur on September 7, 2004. He would not do anything to jeopardize this date. I asked about his reason to disclose this to me, knowing that I was in Social Work and he stated that he felt comfortable and felt he could trust me. He stated that my name was the same as his sister's. I stated that at some point he had made a conscious decision to disclose what he had, and knew that, there would be possible consequences. He stated he knew that but figured he would deny everything if confronted. I went on to ask SPC [REDACTED] about his statements which were pretty serious and asked if he was "pulling my leg" and that at one point in the disclosure I had thought he was making this up. SPC [REDACTED] stated he wasn't and that this was true and he had no regrets. He stated what was occurring in Iraq was awful and that he was very angry at the Iraqi's as well as the US government for placing him in that situation. He stated that sometime during his leave he had been at the mall and saw Muslim women. He stated he looked at them and felt anger and what he did was lift his foot and point to his sole. SPC [REDACTED] stood up and showed me how he had done this. I asked what that meant and he stated that it was a way of being disrespectful and putting them down, that it meant they were lower beneath his foot. He stated he couldn't stop himself from doing this because his anger was intense. At this point it was about 4:25, again I stated that I needed to end. I asked SPC [REDACTED] to reschedule an appointment to meet with me on Monday at 1400, 28 Jun 04, he stated he would think about it and would let me know. He stated that he wanted help instead of being viewed as crazy and that if he could continue to see me without getting in trouble he would do so, but if his chain of command knew about it, he would not return. He stated this several times and even as we stood up, he stood by the door and again asked in a concerned voice what would happen, I stated I didn't know, that I also needed to take in all he had said because it was quite heavy and I needed to process it with my supervisor. SPC [REDACTED] appeared anxious, I walked out with him and because I had to keep another appointment boarded the elevator with him. I stated I was going to the morgue to meet with another family and he said he would go with me. We reached the first floor and went towards the morgue. I stated this was probably not a good idea for him to come given all he had been through, he said he only planned to walk me to it. We found the morgue and I said goodbye, he stated he would think about whether to he would return to see me. I met with my supervisor at the morgue, I told him I needed to speak to him, we walked outside to the patio and I shared with him my interview with SPC [REDACTED]. At that point the decision was made to address this with the hospital commanders, which we then promptly went on to do so.

A: I first met him at 1300, 07 Jun 04, when him and three other soldiers came to my office to in-process. b7C-4, b6-4

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Q: What was his attitude towards you?

A: He was happy go lucky, a bit flirtatious, and in a way asked intrusive questions. It seemed as if he wanted people to pay attention to him.

Q: When did you meet SPC [REDACTED] again? 67C-5, 66-5

A: I met him again on Tuesday, June 22, 2004 at 1520 in the outdoor patio of WBAMC. I was sitting with a friend on a bench talking, SPC [REDACTED] called my name out and came towards me. I did not recognize him initially, but once he approached and I saw his name on his BDU's I remembered him.

Q: Do you think he told you about the abuse and killing the EPW's so as to impress you?

A: Possibly, beginning when I received a message from him in which he said SPC [REDACTED] had called. When he came up to meet with me, he had a big smile, I inquired about the message and he said he was just playing around. He then came into my office and continued to smile and be friendly.

Q: What language was the session in?

A: The session was held mostly in English, but at times, Spanish was used, by both SPC [REDACTED] and myself. 67C-5, 66-5

Q: How was SPC [REDACTED] Spanish? 67C-5, 66-5

A: His Spanish is not fluent, but he can communicate in Spanish. He told me that before he met his wife he did not speak Spanish and had learned it with her because she is from Mexico and that is her primary language.

Q: Who did most of the talking?

A: Primarily SPC [REDACTED] I asked open questions and mostly listened.

Q: Did he explain to you how he put the bleach in the IV's?

A: I believe he did but I don't remember the details.

Q: Did SPC [REDACTED] tell you where the incidents occurred in which he put bleach in the IV's?

A: SPC [REDACTED] stated that these incidents occurred in a hospital where Iraqi EPW's were being cared for.

Q: What was SPC [REDACTED] expression when telling you about hurting the EPW's? 67C-5, 66-5

A: Sometimes he had a slight smile, other times he didn't and appeared serious.

Q: What type of training have you received?

A: I have a Bachelor of Social Work, a Master of Social Work and I completed a year training in Child Treatment. I also have completed my mandatory training in order to keep my licensure up to date, both here in Texas and Illinois.

Q: What does your job entail?

A: I am a Social Work Care Manager that was hired to work with the Social Work Care Manager Program in order to provide support throughout the deployment cycle for those soldiers deploying or redeploying from Iraq. The primary is to help link soldiers and their family members to services in order to help the deployment be smoother. I also brief commanders, FRG's and rear detachments about the program in order to help acquaint them with the program and receive referrals from them.

Q: Who referred SPC [REDACTED] 67C-5, 66-5

A: CPT [REDACTED] the Commander for Alpha Company at WBAMC.

Q: How was the appointment made?

A: SPC [REDACTED] contacted my office on Wednesday, June 23, 2004 at 1000.

Q: What were you told by his supervisors?

A: That he was experiencing problems readjusting from the deployment and that he seemed to have some anger issues.

Q: How long have been working with soldiers?

A: Since January 5, 2004.

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Q: Prior to this had you worked with soldiers?

A: No

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Q: What kind of additional training have you received to deal with soldiers that are returning from deployment?

A: I have received training from my immediate supervisor, MAJ [REDACTED] 67C-3, 66-3 I have attended trainings here at WBAMC and Fort Bliss, as well as read information about deployment related issues.

Q: Prior to you work here have you ever interacted with the military?

A: Yes, in October of 1999, I was asked to be a guest speaker at a hospital in Germany by Kaiserslautern, to speak to soldiers who were celebrating Hispanic Heritage Month.

Q: Did SPC [REDACTED] seem deceptive when he was telling you what he had done?

A: No, although at times he did have a slight smile on his face.

Q: Did SPC [REDACTED] tell you of any particular dreams he had?

A: Yes, he stated that he was experiencing nightmares, both since return from leave and in San Antonio, he associated them with mortars.

Q: Did you ask SPC [REDACTED] to distinguish between his desires and his actions? 67C-5, 66-5

A: No because he stated they were actions.

Q: What led you to believe that they were actions?

A: When he was stating what he did, he showed me with his hands, how he placed bleach in the IV's and he showed me on his arm how he pushed the wound aside and would look for the artery and cut horizontally.

Q: When he was telling you these things, was he telling you they were dreams or his actions.

A: I did not ask that.

Q: What was spoken about confidentiality? 67C-5, 66-5

A: It was discussed in the beginning of the interview. SPC [REDACTED] asked if the session was confidential, I stated that it was but within the limits of confidentiality. I asked him if he knew what these limits were and he responded, that if a person is actively homicidal, suicidal or abusing children this is when confidentiality cannot be held. I stated this was true. He asked if this would get back to his command, and I responded that typically it doesn't.

Q: Was he concerned about you tell someone about what was talked about between you two?

A: Yes, he expressed a lot of concern, stating several times that he was due to ETS September 7, 2004 and all he wanted was to get out. He did not want any problems with the ETS.

Q: Did SPC [REDACTED] tell you of a specific number of EPW's that he killed?

A: No. 67C-5, 66-5

Q: Did he tell you their names?

A: No.

Q: Did he give you specific dates or times?

A: No.

Q: Did he plan out these attacks on the EPW's?

A: I can't remember how he told me but I remember that he did say that he planned out the actions.

Q: Did SPC [REDACTED] tell you why he was moved out of the unit where he was taking of the EPW's?

A: Yes, he stated that a SGT had caught him being overly aggressive to an EPW. SPC [REDACTED] stated that he was called outside and reprimanded and the next day he was transferred to the ER.

Q: Did SPC [REDACTED] ever tell you he worked for ICW? 67C-5, 66-5

A: I don't remember.

Q: Why was he having a hard time in caring for patients in the Labor and

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Delivery Department?

A: He stated that he was having a difficult time going into their room and that he preferred to have distance. I don't remember if he told me why this was hard for him.

Q: Did SPC [REDACTED] tell you what his responsibilities were in Iraq?

A: He was a W. A combat medic.

Q: Did SPC [REDACTED] tell you of any security forces looking after the EPW's?

A: No.

Q: Did SPC [REDACTED] tell you how he had access to bleach?

A: No.

Q: Did SPC [REDACTED] tell you how long he worked taking care of the EPW's?

A: No.

Q: Did SPC [REDACTED] tell you he had bad dreams of being killed by a mortar, or his friends being killed by mortars?

A: I do not remember the specifics but I do remember it had to do with mortars.

Q: Did SPC [REDACTED] tell you he dreamt of doing harm to the EPW's?

A: No.

Q: Did SPC [REDACTED] tell you he wished the infantry would shoot the EPW's right so he wouldn't have to care for them?

A: He told me that he wished that that they were killed and done away with.

Q: Did SPC [REDACTED] tell you he dreamt of punching EPW's or a dream in which he was punching an EPW and his friends did nothing about it?

A: No.

Q: Did SPC [REDACTED] tell you he dreamt of hurting EPW's but in a convoy setting?

A: No.

Q: Did SPC [REDACTED] tell you he wanted to spit in the EPW's food?

A: He told me he did spit in their food and I can't remember the details.

Q: Did SPC [REDACTED] tell you anything about death certificates?

A: Yes, he stated that the death certificates of the EPW's stated they died of their wounds and could not be traced to anything suspicious.

Q: Why do you think SPC [REDACTED] confided in you?

A: He told me he felt comfortable and felt he could trust me and reminded me that I had the same first name as his sister. He also said that from the very first time he met me he felt comfortable.

Q: Do you think you may have misinterpreted what SPC [REDACTED] told you?

A: No.

Q: Why?

A: Because he told me several times that he did not have any regrets about what he had done.

Q: Did SPC [REDACTED] specifically tell you about putting bleach into the EPW's IV's?

A: Yes.

Q: Did he tell you how many times he punched the EPW's?

A: No.

Q: Did you believe SPC [REDACTED] when he told you all the things he did to the EPW's?

A: Initially I had doubts, but as he repeated several times that he had no regrets, I believed him.

A: I observed him angry when he spoke about the blood units, I observed him calm when told me he had no regrets and I observed him smirk when he was telling me what he did to the EPW's.

A: I told her that I did things to EPW's that were in fact fantasies things I wanted to do but never did.

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Q: Ms. [REDACTED] indicated they were not fantasies but that you actually did them, why would she think that?

A: Maybe by the aggressive manner in which I told her I did them, or the vividness of my hand gestures. They were fantasies and not action.

Q: Did you tell Mrs. [REDACTED] you sliced arteries of the EPW's to make them bleed out? b7C-4, b6-4

A: Yes, but I never did that.,

Q: Did you tell Mrs. [REDACTED] you killed several EPW's and that there were no suspicions into their deaths?

A: No, I just told her that they died.

Q: Did you tell Mrs. [REDACTED] there were other personnel who worked with you that also did bad things to the EPW's?

A: No. b7C-4, b6-4

Q: Ms. [REDACTED] indicated you told her there were other personnel who harmed other personnel who harmed EPW's, why would she think that?

A: I don't remember telling her that, I did though tell her there were others who felt the same as I.
