Rights to Freedom of Peaceful Assembly and of Association in the U.S.







Over the past few years, the United States has witnessed an unprecedented number of people taking to the streets to protest a number of issues: the police killings of unarmed Black men and women, development projects infringing on the rights of indigenous peoples, water contamination, presidential travel bans targeting Muslims and refugees, and threats to women's rights. There has also been an increase in anti-union and anti-workers' rights efforts that restrict the right to organize for workers, including migrant workers, and weakens labor power.

This side event will cover the findings and conclusions of a recent report by the former UN Special Rapporteur on Freedom of Assembly and Association, Maina Kiai, about his official visit to the United States, which took place in July 2016. Speakers will discuss the serious threats and challenges to exercising the rights of freedom of assembly and association in the United States, especially in the years that lay ahead.
