Re: United States Periodic Report to the UN Human Rights Committee under the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights (ICCPR)

Dear Ms. McDonald, Mr. Berschinski and Mr. Vail:

The undersigned organizations call on the Biden administration to update the United States' fifth periodic report to the UN Human Rights Committee under the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights (ICCPR). The Committee will be basing its review on this report, which was submitted by the Trump administration on January 15, 2021. This report version lacks updates on existing U.S. policies, as well as a commitment to expand protections for marginalized communities, especially non-citizens, in the context of reproductive health and access to medical care. It is critical — and consistent with the Biden administration's policy commitments — to address the gaps between current U.S. policies and the ICCPR.

<u>Annex B</u> to the ICCPR report should be withdrawn or significantly corrected to reflect current U.S. government policies under the Biden administration, especially with regard to abortion rights and the treatment of non-citizens, including migrants, refugees, and asylum seekers. While the current policy is far from fully compliant with the ICCPR, an updated report reflecting current U.S. policy on these issues will signal to the Human Rights Committee improved progress towards the United States' full compliance with the ICCPR.

<u>Annex C</u> to the report, especially the portions concerning prohibition of torture in the context of solitary confinement, should be revisited altogether, as current U.S. position and policy on this issue remains non-compliant with both the ICCPR and Nelson Mandela Rules.

While we welcome the administration's four ICCPR civil society consultations being held between February and July, we believe that these meetings should be an opportunity to pursue policy changes grounded in U.S. international human rights obligations, especially under the ICCPR. These consultations should elicit concrete policy changes leading up to the ICCPR U.S. review in October. Such action would demonstrate the United States' serious commitment to advancing human rights at home and will be received favorably, we believe, by both civil society and the Human Rights Committee.

We thank you for organizing the consultation process early, and hope that it will have a meaningful impact on domestic policy, along with the U.S. government's eventual presentation before the Committee in October. We look forward to the consultations resulting in expressed commitments and concrete actions from the current administration — pursued through a deliberative and informed process in consultation with civil society.
